



The first Covenantal Sign between God and Noah, the Rainbow (war-bow), directs our gaze towards heaven. The covenants are transcendental signs that help us turn towards God. They help us come from darkness into light, from sin to holiness, from death to life. They transcendent time and place and leads us towards fullness of life and communion with God. Lent is a journey of transformation and conversion that leads us to embrace the Cross of Jesus and live his life and tell his story.

We all know the famous poem "Footprints in the sand." In the poem, we read about two pairs

of footprints along a sandy beach but only one pair of footprints appears during stormy weath-

er and rough seas. Lent is a time for us to look ahead to where Jesus' footprint is leading us.

He leads us into the desert where God is to be found. In this we will also look behind, and we

When we look through the Old Testament, we see God's footprint with his peoples'. The Cov-

enants are God's footprints with his people. We will hear about the first of these in the First

Reading. The rainbow is the first of God's many signs of his covenantal relationship with his

people. It will be helpful for us to reflect on the biblical meaning of this ancient symbol of

The word 'rainbow' comes from the Hebrew word - Qeshet. While modern culture has pro-

posed subjective representations of it, it's ancient and true meaning is quite the opposite and

remains unchanged. Qeshet means a 'war bow' that is used for battle. What battle is being

referred to here? It is the fight against sin. So, the biblical 'rainbow' is firstly God's reminder to

himself about his promise to never flood the earth again. The great flood was not about de-

stroying people and creation. It was God's fight against sin. Man sinned and creation paid the

price. But the Rainbow shows that God has promised he will never deal with sin like he did

The Church Fathers taught that the rainbow points to the Cross – the ultimate war-bow which destroys sin once and for all. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish, but have everlasting life (John 3:16)." The Cross is the sign of the new and eternal covenant. Jesus offered his body and poured his precious blood on the Cross. The Cross of Jesus is the promised of God fulfilled!

As the journey of Lent begins, we will see many footprints along the journey of faith and the way we have been living our lives. But let us not fret nor become discouraged. At times a gush of wind might blur our view of the path ahead. But we follow Jesus not on our merits, but by His promise, His love and His truth.

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

LENT: SPRINGTIME FOR **ALL GOD'S CREATION**

In the southern hemisphere we miss the signs of nature linked in the northern hemisphere to Lent, namely the coming of spring. The word "Lent," is derived from the Old English "lenctern" meaning spring. This poses a challenge for us in Australia's autumn, as we seek to unfold the springtime in our soul. In our scriptural journey into Lent, we are greeted with the sign of God's covenant with Noah: a rainbow. This covenant is not just with Noah and all descendants but with every living creature, everything that lives on the earth. A rainbow may well grace our southern skies in autumn, enabling us to experience ourselves in the embrace of God's covenant with the whole ecological world in which we live. In the Gospel, the Spirit drives Jesus into

the wilderness for forty days along with the wild beasts. Satan the tempter, and the angels who minister to Jesus. These ministering angels, like the rainbow, are a sign of God's ever-presence. As Jesus emerges from his forty days, we hear him begin his ministry in Galilee with "the time is fulfilled and the kingdom of God has come near." Evocatively we have entered our forty days of Lent in a wilderness of ecological crisis. Unseasonal extremes of temperature, floods, fires and all manner of tempests call for us to take heed of the earth in which we dwell. In this time, we can reflect, ecologically and spiritually, to change our hearts and believe the Good News, knowing well God's promise through the rainbow and through the gift of his son.

OUR SUNDAY CELEBRATION

FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT / B

18 FEBRUARY 2024

DRIVEN INTO THE WILDERNESS. The Spirit of God, who descended on Jesus at his baptism, drove him into the wilderness. In the Jewish Scriptures the wilderness is both the place where Israel meets God and the place where it is tempted to worship idols made of stone. The season of Lent is a good time to examine whether we are responding to the Spirit of God in our lives or succumbing to the allurement of false idols.


